OTHER ACHIEVEMENTS *(Please provide any other achievement, which was not captured above, implemented during the reporting period)*

- The micro finance facilitated the training of 50 women awaiting the disbursement while the ministry of women will monitor and supervise the implementation of the programmer
- Adamawa State enhanced the availability, quality, and utilization of BEmONC services.
- Maternal and neonatal mortality and morbidity will be drastically reduced in the state
- Strengthened BEmONC services in the ensures early detection and management of obstetric emergencies such as hemorrhage, eclampsia, sepsis, and obstructed labor, as well as neonatal complications.
- Improvement in health worker capacity, infrastructure, and community awareness is imperative to achieving sustainable health outcomes.

- Partner Reporting: Organizations fill out the 5Ws Matrix based on their ongoing/planned GBV or SRH services.
- Submission: Reports are submitted monthly or quarterly to the sector lead or coordination platform.
- Review & Validation: Focal persons verify accuracy (location, services, duplication).
- Integration: Validated data is compiled into a master matrix, often linked with GIS for mapping and onward upload on the Adamawa State Planning Commission's Citizen's Eyes and Ears Dashboard.
- Dissemination: Shared during coordination meetings and used for strategic planning.

CHALLENGES

- Limited access to dignity kits: due to lack of availability, many survivors struggle with limited access to dignity kits such as pads, soap, undergarment, lacking essential items that are crucial for maintaining their dignity and confidence.
- Due to lack of start-up kits, many survivors who have under-go vocational training are unable to start up a business.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Revision and approval of the Work Plan and early advancement of Funds to ensure quality Implementation of planned activities
- Partners should update the 5Ws Matrix regularly based on field activities.
- Data entry should be consistent with agreed GBV/SRH indicators.
- All information must be verified and validated before submission.
- Coordinate updates with sector leads or designated focal points.

- Identify underserved LGAs, wards, or population groups.
- Guide donors and government on funding needs.
- Align multiple agencies to target high-need areas.
- Compare service coverage across time periods.
- Quickly mobilize services during conflict or disaster outbreak.
- To guarantee enforcement and accurate implementation, a law be enacted by Adamawa State House of Assembly to protect and FastTrack implementation of policies fronted by Adamawa State Planning Commission and other Government agencies.
- Aggressive awareness campaign be launched to make the general public aware of the existing policies.
- Government to partner with relevant CSOs in the timely implementation of the State Youth policy.

OPPORTUNITIES

- The One Stop Center in Yola has become an efficient GBV referral center, with an average of 35 cases per month. Feedback from survivors has been very encouraging, as the center provides almost all services in one place, strictly adhering to minimum standards and adopting a survivor-centered approach.

LESSONS LEARNED

- The toll-free line makes the reporting of GBV cases easier at one stop Centre. Awareness arising and numbers are shared to the general public
- GBV is best addressed in Multidisciplinary Integrated Centers that adhere to the survivor-centered approach
- Establishing referral systems for timely management of obstetric emergencies
